"When the history of this war is written, there may be a hundred days underlined in red pencil—a period in which a young aerodynamic engineer and a veteran designer took a theory on airflow and turned it into the deadliest change-of-pace fighter airplane this stage of the war has yet produced. They call it the North American Mustang—the P-51."

Chock to Chock with Doc

Events at Kitty Hawk on December 17, 1903, serve as the birthmark of the beginning of man's adventuresome relationship with aviation through powered flight. Over a decade later, in early WWI, that relationship between man and the flying machines he operates were strongly suspected as being the cause of many aircraft accidents and deaths. Less than 5% of crashes

at the time were a result of enemy action—the rest were from some failure of the flyer or the aircraft or both. As a result of this abysmal safety record, the military graduated its first class of Flight Surgeons in 1918. They were doctors specifically trained in the physiology and safety of flight, and those first Flight Surgeons were charged with becoming intimately associated with the pilots and their health and safety. Now, a century later, the Armed Forces remain committed to providing the most highly trained and engaged Flight Surgeons to serve the airmen of their operational flying squadrons.
