Sun 'n Fun 2013

Stallion 51's Silver Jubilee celebration—marking 25 years of making Mustang memories for thousands of people—concluded with Sun 'n Fun 2013. Our Mustang Corral was located on the Warbird Flight Line, where we shared memories, food and stories with former clients and friends. We also had the best seats in the house from which to watch Lee perform his signature Solo Mustang routine. It was our way of saying thank you to all of the people who entrusted Stallion 51 with their dream of flying a Mustang.

There were many great stories, but one stood out in particular. Barron Trapp's grandfather was a B-29 pilot and a Bronze Star recipient who was stationed on North Tinian Island in the Pacific. Notably, he was the pilot and crew of the advance weather plane that witnessed both atomic bomb deployments over Hiroshima and Nagasaki in August 1945. The aviation gene was passed down to Barron's father, David, who restores North American warbirds and earned his P-51 Mustang certificate #107 from Stallion 51's check-out training program in December 2007. Barron took his first Mustang ride before he was even born—his mother was 6 months pregnant. He's loved flying ever since. Ironically, little Barron's birthday is August 6, 2008, the 63rd anniversary of the bombing of Hiroshima.

The T-6 Texan turns 75 this year, and it's still a legend in the aviation world. Called the "Pilot Maker," the Texan trained many WWII pilots, and today it continues to help teach the fine art of flying big engine tail wheel airplanes. Flight Back in Time

At 94 years old, Urban Rahoi had ticked off everything on his bucket list but one: fly a Mustang. Urban had spent the vast majority of his life flying; he first flew bombers in the US Army Air Force in WWII, and after the war he flew bush planes in Alaska. It was on the other side of the country though, in Sebring, Florida, where Urban learned to fly the B-17. He was then sent to Italy where he flew both combat missions as well as taught new recruits how to fly multi-engine bombers.

After the war, he packed up his wife and headed for Alaska to make his name and fortune in the wilds above the Arctic Circle. During his lifetime of flight, he accumulated more than 24,000 hours of stick time—but none in the Mustang. It seemed only fitting that he would return to Florida to fulfill that last aviation adventure, flying a P-51 Mustang with Stallion 51's John Posson. Urban had waited a lifetime for the opportunity to take the controls of a P-51 Mustang and Stallion 51's Crazy Horse did not disappoint.

Letters from the Heart

Dana A. "Cobby" Webb wrote 250 letters to his wife and parents during his service in WWII. He was killed in 1955 in an F-84E training flight. Inspired after finding her father's letters, Carole Webb Slater has written a new book titled Letters from the Heart.
